

Jason's odyssey - around the world by pedal boat and roller-blades!

HE mythical Greek hero Odysseus took 10 years to journey home from the Trojan wars to his island of Ithaca and his patient wife Penelope. A West Dorset adventurer, Jason Lewis, is planning to take the same time to complete an even more daunting journey - a complete circumnavigation of the globe, by human power alone! There's a chance to hear some of Jason's adventures - including a brush with a white tip shark, breaking both legs while roller-blading in the USA, having his pedal-boat upturned by a nosy whale and sleeping under water to avoid the attention of biting birdsized insects - at Dorset County Museum. Jason (34), from Askerswell near Bridport, has already roller-bladed and pedalled his boat and bicycle for 20,000 miles, and there is an exhibition of photographs from his travels so far at the museum in High West Street from 15th March. On 15th May he plans to return to Australia to prepare for a 100-day overland expedition off road by mountain bike, with four teenagers from schools in the US, Australia and the UK, plus six adults, two of whom are teachers. Viewers of the television documentary and internet updates will become involved with the personalities as well as following the trials and tribulations of this expedition into the Australian outback.

The next stage of Jason's journey will be a three-week crossing to East Timor in the pedal boat. This will be followed by a five month kayak expedition through the Indonesian islands to Malaysia after the 2002-03 cyclone season. Future stages will include Thailand, Laos, China, across the Himalayas into India, over to North Africa, through Europe, to finish at the Greenwich Meridian, the original starting point.
